
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



"Park" ering is always hard to find, though Ackbar was able to find a spot in the downtown parking garage on Broadway near Main Street.

The historic downtown, primarily encircled in an area bordered by Broadway, Main Street and Middlefield Road, dates from at least 1878. Redwood City was founded by Simon Mezes and incorporated in 1868 and the downtown was built on what was formerly known as the Redwood Creek turning basin. As the name implies, a turning basin is an area of water at the end of a canal or port that allows for ships to turn and reverse direction.

Redwood Creek turning basin served as an

important port in the mid-peninsula region for delivery of wood log, prior to completion of the railway connecting San Fran-



cisco and San Jose in 1864.

By (at least) 1915, the historic downtown came to resemble more closely what it is today geologically, with the basin water having receded (and drained).


Ackbar checks out a structure on the site of the oldest brick and stone commercial building in Redwood City, the Diller-Chamberlain Store.







Noticing the vertical column, Ackbar ascended the pole to obtain a wider view of the street in the historic Redwood City downtown.






Ackbar visited the San Mateo Historic Museum and society, noticing the intricate metal work designs throughout the building, which used to be a courthouse.





